my chopper. I try to take as many flights as I can."

He is an assistant professor of psychiatry and human behavior, and an assistant professor of family practice at the Thomas Jefferson University College of Medicine.

Special favorites are helicopters, birds, food and wine. His chopper is named "Egret."

"Flying for Angel Flight is extremely rewarding," he says. I have learned much from my passengers...I believe it has made me a better doctor. I always consider it a privilege to be allowed into their [patients'] lives and to fly them.

"I try to do whatever I can to make the flight more comfortable, but the person is always so grateful that they never ask for anything. It puts my life in perspective."
